Phenology: Nature's Timetable

Phenology is one of the oldest of environment sciences. It has been used for millennia to track the lifestages---sprouting, flowering, seed production--of plants. Indicator plants have served as guides for gardeners and farmers to plant. Phenology also offers guidance in applying fertilizer, pest control and pruning. For instance:

- when forsythia blooms, treat for crabgrass;
- when crocus bloom, prune roses;
- when crabapple are at budbreak, eastern tent caterpillars are hatching. Bring in pollinator-friendly pest control;
- when daffodils begin to bloom, plant peas;
- when apple trees shed petals, plant corn;
- when dogwood and lily-of-the-valley bloom, plant eggplant, peppers, tomatoes;

--when maple leaves begin to open, plant perennials;
--once lilacs fade, plant squash and cucumbers;
--when mock orange blooms, plant cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower for a second harvest.

REMEMBER: Ticks are already active, and they're everywhere. As you begin spring clean-up and gardening, protect your ankles (the favorite point of entry). Tuck pants into socks and seal with elastics. Then spray clothes and shoes—not skin—with permethrin. It remains effective on clothes through six wash/dry cycles. After showering, check again for ticks. Use a mirror to view your back and scalp.
