Winter Wrap-Up Indoor gardeners are confused by the winter flowering cactus all called "Christmas cactus". The cactus your grandmother displayed and passed cuttings among family and friends was Schlumbergera truncata, the long-lived (often more than a century) lobster cactus. The foliage boasts points along its foliage, but is less common on the retail market today because the 'foliage', called Phylloclades, are actually flattened stems and are delicate and breakable. They can be broken simply during watering. Pieces are easily rooted in slightly damp potting or seed starting soil. The phylloclades of contemporary Christmas cactus, Schlumbergera brigesii, have smooth sides. A third cactus, the Easter cactus, *Rhipsalidopsis gaertneri*, has smooth sides to the 'leaf' and a fluffy blossom or sometimes two at the tip of the 'leaf'. They bloom in March or April. (over)

JR. GARDENER ENVIRONMENAL PROGRAM – We received a generous grant from Entergy Plymouth to pay for the seedling trees that we will give out to the 5th graders for Arbor Day. We will need to package the seedlings between April 24-26 and need someone to host the packaging session.

The school presentations begin on March 5 and continue through April. We still need a volunteer to assist on March 26 and 28. If you can help out, contact Geri.

PLANT SALE ALERT - There are only three 'Garden Cub Days' until the **Spring Plant Sale , May 19**. As the garden awakens, make note of perennials that are crowded and dig and pot plants for the sale. Trees, shrubs and bushes can be dug and potted while still dormant. Store the pots in a spot that receives morning sun and partial afternoon shade. Keep the potted plants moist but not soaked. Include a name label. If digging is not your 'thing', consider container or basket gardens. Line baskets with plastic food containers and cut slits for drainage. Fill with potting soil and annuals or grasses.

The Christmas cacti come in red, magenta, white, yellow, tangerine. The Easter cacti come in magenta. All three like welldrained, light potting soil. Keep out of direct sun and allow soil to dry before watering. Provide temp of 55 to 60 degrees and 12 to 14 hours of darkness to encourage blooms.

This has been a horrendous winter for our birds. I have noticed a decline in the feeder census since November. It is crucial to provide feeder food. The seed heads left in the garden last fall have been stripped. I recommend a variety of seeds (except millet) plus dried insects, fruit and seed cakes. Some birds prefer ground feeders. Millet attracts sparrows who bully and drive away other birds from the feeders now, and nesting sites later – even bluejays. According to Birds and Blossoms there are new guidelines for feeding birds. This winter/spring the recommendation is using only previously uncooked rendered beef fat. There are too many additives and nitrates in bacon fat. Bread, rolls, cakes are unhealthy because they host mold that is toxic to birds.

Seed are most birds' natural diet. Leave gardens 'au natural' in the fall. Then supplement with feeders. Carnivores such as robins, catbirds, mocking birds welcome freeze dried insects and dry fruit. Nuthatches and wood peckers adore suet cake with added seed and fruits. I am hosting a flock of 30 turkeys, hens and toms, in my garden. Do you have any idea how much 30 turkeys can eat in 20 minutes? Yikes! **GARDEN THERAPY** - The next Garden Therapy program will be on **March 8 at 9:45 am at Life Care Center** on Obery Street.
