## **February For the Birds**

The unusual birds we see at our winter feeders are driven there by spring conditions in the northern boreal forests. Cold, wet springs like the last two, cause pine and spruce trees to produce fewer cones, the principal food for most northern songbirds. Normally these birds migrate only short distances. But food shortages force birds to head south out of their normal range, an irruptive migration. Birds such as Bohemian waxwings, pine siskins, red-breasted nuthatches, crossbills, redpolls pine and evening grosbeaks show up at Mass. feeders.

These northern visitors and our normal winter birds such as chickadees, goldfinches, house and white-throated sparrows, some robins and eastern bluebirds, jays, juncos and of course, cardinals employ a range of techniques to survive cold. These include food caches and roosting in groups. Birds grow more feathers and fluff them to create air spaces close to the skin. They also add weight during fall's bounty of food.

Birds such as chickadees and nut

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hatches switch from a carnivorous diet of insects by becoming omnivorous. They can be supported by feedings of suet and insect cakes, sunflower seeds and finding insects hidden in nooks and crannies of tree bark.

Ground feeders such as robins, jays and cardinals can be attracted by filling an old birdbath or a disposable roaster with sunflower seeds and crumbled suet cakes and setting it on the ground. Fill up all feeders late in the afternoon, before dusk to assure energy for the long cold nights. Leave nest boxes and see grass shelters up for night shelter and group roosting to conserve body heat.

When landscaping or adding to your plant inventory include plants and trees bearing late season fruits such as holly, crab apple and beauty berry. They hold fruit late into winter. Avoid cutting seed bearing plant heads, such as Monarda, Echinacea, Queen Anne's lace which birds clean up. Every bit of nourishment will be eaten by the birds.

Hang suet feeder in places easily accessible for filling but near small trees and bushes for protection from small predators. Don't forget to put our your Christmas tree, wreath or cut branches. They make excellent cover for flower beds and shelter for birds. A temporary tree can be made by fastening evergreen branches to a tall tomato cage and adding snacks to the branches.
