In Absence of our monthly update From Joy Sand and to go with our Monthly Topic <u>A Charming Plant Combination</u> for Shady Gardens, Candelabra <u>Primroses, Fern & Bulges</u>



Brighten a moist and shady area of your garden with this striking plant combination pairing the eye catching blossoms of Primula japonica (Japanese Primrose) with the fresh, unfurled green fronds of Matteuccia struthiopteris (Ostrich Fern).

Interplant charming foliage plants and attractive groundcovers such as Hosta "Wide Brim" (Plantain Lilly) with its mound of broadly, heart shaped variegated leaves; Ajuga reptans "Catlin's Giant" (Carpet Bugle) with its blue-violet flower spikes rising from rosettes of large, glossy purplish-bronze leaves: Viola sororia (Common Blue Violet) with its shiny leaves topped with delicate, blue-violet flowers and Phlox divaricate (Woodland Phlox) with its clusters

JANUARY 11TH from 6:30 to 7:30 Native New England Flora with Master Gardener Gretel Anspach Native New England Flora: This presentation focuses on the native plants of New England. Plants native to our region will be easier to maintain, better able to withstand New England weather and may offer better resistance to deer and rabbits. The trees, shrubs, and perennials that evolved here will grow here with much less input from you. You will reduce your workload while creating a paradise for the native birds and pollinators. Winter Sowing with Cathy Acampora from Plymouth 4H In-Person on Saturday the 21st from 2 to 3PM: Learn how to sow your seeds the easy way! No more electricity, less water, and no more taking up space in your home! Let Mother Nature do the work for you! You will used recycled materials like milk jugs to create your cold weather garden. If you don't have one, one will be provided for you. Registration is required.

Let's Practice Eco-Friendly Landscaping

Among the goals of an 'Eco-Friendly Landscape' are:

Provide healthy habitat for pollinators and other wildlife. Control storm water on the site and allow it to soak in slowly. Conserve water and treat it like the important natural resource it is. Create healthy soils without pesticides, fungicides, herbicides, fertilizers.

Some things you can do to achieve this:

Plant native plants, shrubs and trees. Native species provide biodiversity important for pollinators, birds and wildlife, require no fertilizer and most are drought tolerant. Minimize lawn area.

Create a vegetable garden and compost

Plant more trees for today and tomorrow. Trees offer home energy savings through shade from hot summer sun and buffering of winter winds. They sequester carbon, clean the air and support a myriad of species of important insects and other wildlife.

Minimize hard surfaces: instead of traditional asphalt, consider alternatives like porous pave® made of recycled tires; perkcrete® – a permeable concrete; porous asphalt grasspave® - a grid system that allows grass to grow while providing a stable surface for vehicles.
