## Life in Bloom – J. Schwanky

Michigan floralist Jay Schwanky defines a life in bloom as on that shares, celebrates and incorporates flowers every day. We can all lead lives in bloom.

Sharing flowers can be as simple maintaining a front garden for the pleasure of passersby. Or buying a selection of cut flowers and arranging them in a vase or container and presenting the flowers to a friend or family member as a gift.

Celebrating and incorporating flowers can evolve from "arranger planting" Approach your garden plot as a giant flower arrangement. Choose and group flowers and plants as if arranging a bouquet. Tall shrubs and perennials form the background. Perennials such as coneflowers, asters, golden rod, phlox provide color and form. Vines or "weeping" plants such as andromeda, clematis, some honeysuckles offer a graceful draping effect.

For the middle or body of your "garden bouquets", consider black eyed Susan, day lilies, peonies, roses, liatris, lavender, provide all season color interest

**Beth Israel Flower Pots:** We are looking for volunteers to maintain the 6 Flower Pots located at Beth Israel Hospital. Please let Colleen Costa know if you can help out, she has taken on two pots, four are still available. Ornamental grasses come in a variety of colors, textures and heights.

For the front of the border, Dianthus provides the colors and fragrance of the carnation on a shorter plant. Rudbeekia, and coneflower hybrids are being introduced in shorter sizes for the front of the borders and bouquets.

Horticultural mistakes of the past are best avoided. Don't plant the, burning bush, rose of Sharon and yellow bamboo were introduced as background high summer colors or bright fall foliage. They did their jobs too well and are now invasive.

Many of the plants and flowers recommended are native species. They provide pollen and nectar for pollinators and seeds or fruits, food for the birds and small animals.
