From Joy Sand Rethinking Clematis Myths

Myth 1: Clematis take a long time to establish. Truth: Not necessarily. Plant prime modern hybrids that are remarkably "unfussy" augment the planting hole with compost. Then feed tomato fertilizer once a month in the first season. Pinch the stems back twice in the first season to encourage branching. Myth 2: Clematis need their "feet" in the shade, "heads" in sun. Truth: To encourage deep roots, simply water clematis deeply and less often. Base plants can harbor slugs and shade roots, confusing the plant to put out branches higher up, reaching for sunlight. Myth 3: A clematis pruned incorrectly may die. Truth: Clematis are vines. It is difficult to kill by cutting (think trumpet vine, some honeysuckle). Flowering may be delayed or diminished by inaccurate pruning. Group clematis flower on all wood. Prune after blooming. Group flowers on old and new growth. The largest blooms come from old growth. Prune only ends that are damaged or lack growth. Group 3 are vigorous bloomers. They flower on new growth that comes from old growth

LIBRARY BEDS: Debby Clark-Lalley will continue to update us on the needs of the library beds. Help will be needed to make sure the planting are maintained during the summer months.

Myth 4: Clematis wilt is huge problem. Wilt is most often due to weather or insect damage. (Usually from slugs). Tying vines too tightly to a trellis will damage tender stems and cause wilt. Myth 5: Clematis have a short bloom span. Truth: Most **Clematis reflower if trimmed** gently and fertilized mid-season. Continue to water deeply during hot dry weather. If a vine is overgrown and woody, trim the plant and fertilize and water. Plant vour Clematis in adequate sunlight (at least 3 hours and in well-drained soil). Tomato fertilizer is ideal for Clematis because it is lower in Nitrogen and encourages Flowering. Control slugs which sap the plants energy and deface blossoms and leaves.
