The goal is to give the bulbs enough time to grow roots before the ground freezes and to literally chill out. After they get enough time in cold temperatures, they'll start growing leaves and flowers.



Planting bulbs can seem complicated, but you can simplify the process by following this general rule of thumb: plant twice as deep as your bulb height. For instance, if the bulb is two inches tall, dig a hole and plant the bulb four inches down. You can also add a couple of inches of garden mulch on top of the soil after planting without hindering the bulbs when they emerge in spring.

This month's homework assignment for the Plant Sale -locate pots for transplanting. All members are reminded that the Plant Sale is successful because we all have dug up a dozen things from our yards.) SIGN UP SHEETS - there will be sign-up sheets for plant sale - Bakers, Yard Helpers (morning and afternoon) Boutique helpers (need lead) Gear - list your wagon and similar lugging equipment Signs/Flyer - sign up to do lawn signs and window flyers (available April Meeting) The Boutique will offer garden related items - start collecting!

The Plant Sale will begin at 10am and continue until 2pm on the lawn in front of the Plymouth Public Library. As you walk around your gardens and begin to clean them up look for perennials and especially native plants that can be divided or 'volunteers' where you don't want them to pot up for the sale when they are growing a little better. Right now, is the time to start annual flower seeds such as marigolds, cosmos, zinnias, alyssum and similar easy to grow seeds. You don't need to buy a fancy shop light to supplement the light, you can use a cheap fluorescent shop light. We need many members to volunteer to help on the day of the sale. Some of our volunteers should come to the library at 7:15am to help the custodian bring out the library tables and begin setting up. More volunteers will be needed to help unload plants, price and place them. With another group of volunteers scheduled during the sale to help customers. We usually have sold most of the plants by 1-1:30pm and begin cleaning up and tearing down some of the tables then. A few more volunteers will be needed at 2pm to finish cleaning up.

Free Books: There will be a table set up at the March meeting with gardening books donated by Coletta Candini. She would like everyone to take one. Thank you Colletta for your generosity and kindness.

<u>Annual June Luncheon</u>: Plans are being made for our annual June Luncheon. Members will have a choice of two menu selections, Chicken Piccata or Seared Salmon.
