The Care and Feeding of Hydrangeas

One of the most beloved of the high summer blooming shrubs is the Hydrangea. The name comes from two Greek words meaning water and vessel. The Hydrangea needs ample water and bears cup shaped blossoms. They are native to southern and eastern Asia. Hydrangeas come in colors of white, blue, pink and even red and green.

Some colors are affected by soil ph. In acidic soil, the flowers will be blue to purple. Alkaline soil produces pink shades. White blossoms are not affected by ph. Some of the new hybrids are not affected either.

Hydrangeas bloom on old wood - last years' growth, or new wood - this years' growth. Most Hydrangeas sold in nurseries carry labels specifying which bloom habit the shrub has. Most of the classic Hydrangeas such as Nikko Blue bloom on old wood. That means when cutting blooms for arrangements, deadheading, or pruning, cut at a leaf notch, the point where

leaves attach to the stem. The next bud will form there. Hydrangeas that bloom on new wood can be cut anywhere on the stem. In the spring, once buds are visible, cut away any dead wood.

Newer hybrid Hydrangeas can be as compact as 2 feet tall. They are suitable for container gardening. Being perennial, the pots need winter protection. Save bubble wrap to tie around the pot. Sprinkle rodent repellent on the soil and store in a frost free garage or shed. Check the soil periodically to be sure it doesn't dry out. Return the container to the outdoors in mid March.

Hydrangeas in the garden need their space. They can grow up to 10 feet tall and wide. They need a minimum of 3 hours sunlight to bloom, but should be shielded from hot western facing sun. Do not allow the shrub to dry to the point of leaf wilt. During recent droughts, I mulched my Hydrangeas with aged compost to hold moisture. They thrived.

Hydrangeas cut for arrangements need plenty of fresh water and Floral Life. Cut the stems on a 45 degree angle and remove most leaves. Hydrangeas are the only cut flower that drink through their blooms. I tried misting the arrangement daily, and the blooms did last longer.

PROPOSED BY LAW: On April 3, 2024, the Board voted in favor of the following by-law change. The purpose of this is to be in compliance with Garden Club Federation of Massachusetts by-law wording regarding Elections. It will also provide more clarity on the wording of the Article about when the membership votes. We will vote on this amendment at the meeting. Wording in red is the proposed changes.

Section 1. The Nominating Committee shall consist of three members, each with at least two years' membership, two appointed by the President and one elected by the membership. This committee shall present their Proposed Slate of Officers to the Board of Directors at the April Board meeting for information only. At the General meeting in April, the Nominating Committee will present the Slate of Officers to the membership.

Section 2. The Election of Officers shall take place at the May General meeting, which is one month prior to our Annual Meeting in June.
