Summer Vacation Is Over For Houseplants From Joy Sand

Houseplants that went outside for "summer vacation" need to return to their 'home, sweet home" for the fall and winter. First move plants from bright sunlight to more shady locations for four or five days to minimize shock.

Most likely, the plant has outgrown its pot. If roots protrude from the drain hole, the plant is pot bound and needs to be repotted, use a pot no more than 2 inches wider than the old one. Cut away the escaping roots from the pot with a sharp knife or scissors.

Plants such as spider plant (Chlorophytum), peace lily (Spathiphyllum), flamingo flower (Anthurium) and peacock plants (Calathea), tropicals grown primarily for their foliage, have clumping root systems, and they are easy to divide. Shake off most of the soil and slice through the roots where they meet the plant. Be sure each new plant has at least three healthy leaves. Repot each plant in a new pot with fresh soil. Keep the plants moist, but not soggy.

If not dividing a plant, remove it from the pot, shake off the soil and resettle the plant with fresh soil. Add the spent soil to the compost.

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Keep plants well watered. Before bringing your plants inside, inspect them for pests. Spraying with a fine mist of water or dilute Neem oil will discourage hitchhikers.

Although not dormant, most houseplants slow their metabolism during fall and winter. They need less water and no fertilizer. Over watering creates boggy soils and encourages fungus gnats. Water when the top inch or two of soil feels dry. Holiday blooming plants have been "force fed" to prepare them for sale. They continue to need water, but no fertilizer.

Groom plants to remove dead or dying leaves, but postpone pruning until spring. Most houseplants originated in the tropics and need humidity support in our dry homes. Run a humidifier or place plants on pebble and water filled saucers.

In the spring, usually mid May, houseplants can return to the outdoors. Some tender tropicals like orchids and African violets should never leave home.

Let's Practice Eco-Friendly Landscaping

Among the goals of an 'Eco-Friendly Landscape' are:

Provide healthy habitat for pollinators and other wildlife.

Control storm water on the site and allow it to soak in slowly.

Conserve water and treat it like the important natural resource it is.

Create healthy soils without pesticides, fungicides, herbicides, fertilizers. Some things you can do to achieve this:

Plant native plants, shrubs and trees. Native species provide biodiversity important for pollinators, birds and wildlife, require no fertilizer and most are drought tolerant.

Minimize lawn area.

Create a vegetable garden and compost

Plant more trees for today and tomorrow. Trees offer home energy savings through shade from hot summer sun and buffering of winter winds. They sequester carbon, clean the air and support a myriad of species of important insects and other wildlife.

Minimize hard surfaces: instead of traditional asphalt, consider alternatives like porous pave® made of recycled tires; perkcrete® – a permeable concrete; porous asphalt and grasspave® - a grid system that allows grass to grow while providing a stable surface for vehicles.
