> Unusual Evergreens By Joy Sand

Having just completed another Green Sale, this may be a good time to consider adding some unconventional evergreens to your garden. Many of these plants offer 'additional gifts' of blossoms for pollinators and seeds or fruit for birds and mammals. The stems should be kept in water until they are added to displays. Stems may be wired to pointed sticks for added strength.

Lungwort *Pulmonaria* - zone 3-8 bares speckled silvery green foliage that lasts all winter. Purple and white flowers in early spring feed early pollinators.

Mediterranean Spurge *Euphorbia* zone 6-8 - is a sculptural plant of whorled blue green foliage. The neon green stems provide added interest.

Bugle weed *Ajuga* - zone 3-10 - the black scarlet leafed variety is a compact ground cover having long stems with purple black leaf. Rich blue flowers support pollinators in mid to late spring. It can be invasive, best grown in containers or hanging baskets.

Pigsqueak *Bergenia* - zones 4-10 -Fairytale Romance variety sports foliage that turns reddish in cold weather; the leaves make dramatic accents. The plant is also an early bloomer.

Ligonberry *Vaccinium vitis idaea*zones 4-8 - has long branches of tiny bell shaped blossoms in spring, succulent red berries in late summer, and is related to blueberries. The decorative shrub supports pollinators, birds, and humans. At 6-8 feet tall the red branches are decorative.

Heath and Heathers *Ericaceae* zones 3-8 - bloom in winter to spring, providing flowers and durable foliage for winter arrangements.

These are but a few of the unusual evergreens. Think outside the box.
