> No Mow May By Joy Sand

A new effort to support pollinators, especially early bees, is 'No Mow May'. The idea is spreading on social mediator through yard signs. Delaying the first mowing allows early pollen sources such as clover, dandelions, oxeye daisies to bloom. The idea originated in the UK and is compatible with our USDA Zone 6B. But if the lawn has been treated for weeds, there may not be any pollen sources to bloom. Those living ithere are drawbacks. Pollinators fregun our area where lawn length is dictated by local ordinance or homeowners association may not have the freedom to choose not to mow. Although 'No Mow' has increased the awareness of pollinators and their needs, there are drawbacks. Pollinators frequenting an unmoved lawn will be displaced when sheering resumes. Some may even be killed in the first mow. Its is best to reintroduce mowing in stages. Begin with a string trimmer, and lower the height in stages. There are alternatives to 'No Mow'. First, eliminate all lawn insecticides
